Some People Suffer More than Others

unemployment benefits. Many of them are fathers and mothers. They have worked in this country most of their lives.

The pandemic was very hard for excluded workers. Many lost their jobs. They did not have money for food or rent.

We Fight for Workers' Rights

I work for the Consortium for Worker Education (CWE). We work with with unions and community organizations. We give training and employment services to workers in New York City. Here is the story of what we did to ease the crisis for our workers.

- We helped students learn Zoom, so they could continue their ESOL classes.
- We helped families find the bodies of their loved ones who died of Covid-19 in the hospital.
- We gave food to people who did not have enough.
- We fought for laws that would make workers more safe on the job.
- We fought for a law that gives unemployment benefits to excluded workers.
