“Thank you all for the assistance you have given during this tax season,” said the email. It came

from the coordinator of the volunteer program I work with that provides free tax help to people who need it. It was late April, and we were

close to the end of the 2021 tax season. With some satisfaction, I *reminisced* about how bittersweet the last 15 months had been!

In 2020, I was ready to start my work as an IRS tax volunteer. I had finished my training and my exams, and I was excited to use my skills. Just as I began making new friends and helping people in need, my volunteering journey, which was less than a month old at that time, was suspended. Our governor announced a shelter-at-home order on March 16, 2020, and our tax site closed. My feelings were mixed. I hated to see my volunteer work cut short, but I also worried about the *looming* threat of Covid-19. No one knew exactly how serious it could be. While spring was just waking up, I entered *hibernation*.

Work remotely? This exciting news woke me up. I immediately replied, saying I was interested in participating. As winter began, all the tax volunteers were poised to contribute, to connect with people, and to feel alive.

The 2021 tax season was indeed a big challenge: all the in-person services were replaced by a new online platform, and communications were done by phone, email, or text. Even so, all of us volunteers tried our best to help taxpayers navigate the complicated tax world. We assisted people to get refunds or to understand why they might owe taxes. Although I couldn’t see the smiles of the taxpayers, whenever they said “thank you” on the phone, I felt warmth in my heart.

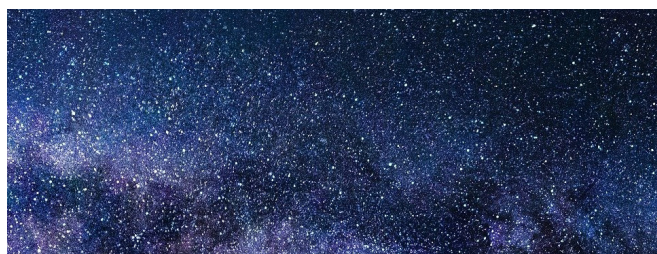
